Connecting Kids to Meals Provides Daily Lunches

Padua Center reached out to the neighborhood and partnered with Connecting Kids to Meals to offer free lunches to children five days a week with a weekend bag on Friday. Padua Center began this program in March, soon after the shutdown. We continue to daily offer lunch bags to the neighbors.



Thanks are due to United Way volunteers who came to help Sr. Virginia and Avery Cooper with daily lunches. When employees were able to return to work, in May, Bre'Ana Levesque and Kim McFann began to help with lunches. During the summer camps we added the Harbor Youth workers to the roster as lunch time helpers.



Daily the Center serves between 25-40 lunches. On Tuesday, Padua adds a hot sandwich to the

menu, and everyone loves Friday because it is Pizza Day! Avery Cooper picks up daily lunches from Connecting Kids to Meals and returns the empty coolers at

the end of the day for refills.

Gardening at Padua Center's Ujima Urban Agriculture Continues

This year, COVID-19 and a late Spring snow delayed the gardening project. Due to the Stay at Home Order, Pathstone Trainees could not work in the garden until July. Instead, Roger Whickum and Sr Virginia got the garden started. Once Janda Burwell returned things in the garden went full speed ahead.

Rep Marcy Kaptur extended an invitation to Isabel Montez, Brian Ellis, and Steve Oswanski to meet with Sister Virginia and to discuss the maximum utilization of the Hoop House. After some preliminary discussions Padua Center decided to use solar panels to provide electricity for watering and cooling the Hoop House. Now we only need to assure funding and implement the plan!

After proper safeguards from groundhogs and rabbits, Padua Center looks forward to a good and productive season in the garden.

Employees and Youth Workers at Summer Camp

Avery Cooper and Bre'Ana Levesque kept the summer camps going with the challenge of COVID-19 and new directives. In June, families came one morning or afternoon a week. Padua Center served ten families for two hours each week. In July, new directives allowed the camps to have nine children. A total of 21 children participated in the summer camps, although never more than nine at a time. A trip to the Sculpture Garden at the Art Museum was a highlight of the summer. Games, fun and just being children (albeit with masks on) was part of the summer, as well as educational activities.

Major Improvements on Padua Center Continue

For several years there was discussion about demolishing St. Anthony Church and possibly Padua Center. During that time, Padua Center received no significant improvements. Now that the future for Padua Center is no longer in question, the Center received a major facelift this past year.

In August 2019, Chittum Painting LLC began painting the exterior of Padua Center. Padua donors were extremely generous and matched a grant from the Andersons Fund Supporting Organization of the Greater Toledo Community Foundation.



Seagate Roofing installed a new roof in March 2020.

The next project was the roof. Seagate Roofing began working in March 2020 to complete a roof replacement for Padua

Center. Once again funds donated by long-time supporters matched

funds from the Community Economic Development Grant of the Toledo-Lucas County Port Authority.

With the painting and roofing completed it was time to reinstall the accessibility ramp

previously removed when St. Anthony church was under consideration for demolition. Special thanks to Duane Buck, John Hartigan and Matthew Cornette, Jr of Oak Harbor who came to Padua Center and in three hours had the ramp up and functioning.
