



Building Improvements!

Thanks to a Rotary Grant The Padua Center is looking forward to some improvements in the building and also in programming. The Padua Center has been awarded a \$10,000 grant from the Toledo Rotary, through the Toledo Community Foundation to replace the crumbing wall in the work room. (See picture on the right.) But, first The Padua Center had some significant gutter and downspout work done. Now, with the water going away from and not seeping into the building we are able to address the damaged wall.

Also included in the grant is money for the replacement of the flooring in the copier room and the second floor hallway. This flooring is very old and was installed before asbestos was used. Therefore there is no need of asbestos removal. The flooring in the kitchen and first floor hallway has asbestos in it which will need to be removed before new flooring is installed.

Although the Rotary Grant is significant, we will need to raise about \$10,000 more to complete the job. With this annual report we are seeking an 'end of the year' donation to help with the new flooring.

Ujima Urban Agriculture

In addition to planting, weeding, watering and harvesting a variety of vegetables and fruits, Kasey devotes some time each day to study and learning. He has completed several classes and has applied that knowledge to the Ujima Garden.

Toledo Grows offered a grant to The Padua Center and a new plastic 'roof' for the hoop house has been purchased. In addition several new raised beds have been purchased. These will make it
