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### Padua Center begins Padua Possibilities

After many months of planning, The Padua Center has begun an innovative program to address the suspension issue in the local schools. Funded in part

by a grant from the Marguerite D'Youville Foundation II, the Padua Possibilities offers an intervention program for suspended children from Pickett Academy. Parents and guardians must attend a session at the Padua Center the first day of a child's suspension and spend approximately 1 1/2 hours with Padua Staff to explore issues that might cause the child's behavior.

Simultaneously the suspended student meets with a counselor. After the first hour session parent and child can meet together to

discuss possible alternative behaviors that might prevent further suspensions. After lunch, the child meets with Dr. Lynne Hamer of the University of Toledo who works with the child on alternatives to violence and disruptive behavior. Two hours of academic tutoring complete the day for the suspended child. In October and November the Padua Center had five different children participate in the program. It will be several months before we can judge the success of the program.

### St. Marguerite d'Youville Foundation II Awards Grant

In the midst of a tough economic climate and great losses for many foundations, the St. Marguerite d'Youville Foundation II granted \$15,399 to the Padua Center for two innovative programs focused on helping students achieve academic excellence. The Padua Possibilities program provides an alternative to suspension for children from Pickett Academy. The Vision Therapy program, to begin in January, will screen children for vision stress and will then provide therapy for them at The Padua Center. Dr. Jeffery Schmakel is assisting in the implementation of the Vision Therapy program. Two therapists are receiving training.
