



Baldemar Valesquez

Keynote Speaker and



The Padua Center is proud to welcome Baldemar Valesquez as the keynote speaker for this year's "Peaces" of Art celebration. He will also be presented the Padua Promoter Award. Baldemar Valesquez, president of the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC) grew up in a migrant farmworker family based in the Rio Grande Valley of Texas. Each year he traveled the migrant trail of harvesting farm crops. His family settled in Ohio and after high school Baldemar graduated from Bluffton College, the first member of his family to do so. Incensed by the injustices suffered by his family and other farmworkers, Baldemar founded the Farm Labor Organizing Committee (FLOC) in 1967. Baldemar is an internationally recognized leader in the farmworker and immigrant rights movement. His commitment to justice and human dignity make him a perfect Padua Promoter.



Fletcher Word—MC for "Peaces" of Art

Fletcher Word grew up in New York City and was raised in Washington, DC. He is a graduate of Harvard University, majoring in Government. He also serves as president of the Toledo Urban Federal Credit Union Board of Directors.
